Greetings! Following are examples of article use—as you read through them, please notice the articles and think about the explanations in class ©

- <u>The</u> numbers on <u>a</u> clock begin with <u>the</u> number 1 and continue through 12. On some clocks, however, they begin with <u>the</u> Roman numeral "I" and go through "XII". <u>The</u> hour hand is shorter, and <u>the</u> minute hand is longer—and, of course, <u>the</u> second hand is faster.
- In Kashiwa there are two Starbucks near Kashiwa Station. <u>The</u> one near <u>the</u> East Exit is smaller, and <u>the</u> one near <u>the</u> West Exit is much larger. I often go to <u>the</u> one near <u>the</u> West Exit because <u>the</u> atmosphere is very relaxed and it has wonderful "easy chairs" for reading, studying, and sleeping.
- 3) There will be <u>a</u> test next week. <u>The</u> test will be "open-book", and I also allow students to use <u>their</u> notes. However, you may not talk to <u>your</u> neighbor!
- 4) <u>The final exam for each class comes during the exam week at the end of each semester.</u>
- 5) I have four brothers (=There are five boys in my family), and I'm #4. <u>The</u> oldest lives in Thailand and is <u>a</u> senior geologist with Unocal Oil. <u>The</u> second is <u>a</u> hospital pharmacist in Nevada in <u>the</u> US. <u>The</u> third one is <u>a</u> computer engineer and system manager at <u>a</u> hospital in Colorado. I'm <u>an</u> English teacher in Japan, and, specifically, I'm <u>your</u> teacher. Finally, <u>my</u> younger brother is <u>a</u> computer programmer in <u>our</u> hometown in Montana.
- 6) In <u>the</u> Elwood family, we have <u>an</u> interesting week in December. <u>My</u> birthday is December 12, and <u>my</u> father's birthday was <u>the</u> 13th. Next is <u>my</u> younger son's birthday, which is <u>the</u> 14th. Finally, <u>my</u> mother's birthday is <u>the</u> 15th. Really. <u>My</u> younger son was born here in Japan, by the way, and because of <u>the</u> time difference between <u>the</u> US and Japan, I was able to call <u>my</u> father on <u>his</u> birthday (<u>the</u> 13th) and announce, "Dad, your grandson was born tomorrow!" Of course, <u>my</u> father always insisted that he and <u>his</u> grandson shared <u>the</u> same birthday.
