# Skill 5 Summarizing the Points

To write the integrated essay, you have to understand the main points in both the lecture and the reading. You have to know the relationship of the lecture to the reading. You have to summarize the main points. Look at this essay on the topic of solar energy, and compare it with the example outline in Skill 4.

#### Example

Question: Summarize the points made in the lecture, and explain how they cast doubt on the points made in the reading.

The reading presents solar energy as a good alternative energy source, but the lecturer points out that solar energy has several disadvantages.

Many people think of solar energy as a free way to generate electricity and heat water. The lecturer agrees that this is true after a solar energy system has been installed. She points out, however, that installing the system is not free. In fact, many people cannot afford it.

Another reason solar energy is popular is because it doesn't cause pollution. It is clean and quiet and does not ruin beautiful scenery. Nevertheless, many people think solar panels are ugly, according to the lecturer. Solar panels on a roof look better than solar panels in a yard. Still there are many people who might not want to install them on their roofs because they do not look nice.

People also believe that solar energy can be used everywhere, according to the reading passage, and this is an advantage for people in rural areas. The lecturer points out that this is not completely true. Although solar energy is useful in places that have a lot of sunshine, it is difficult to use in northern areas and rainy regions. The lecturer believes that solar energy is a good alternative energy source in some situations, but not in all.

# Skill 6 Citing and Paraphrasing

For most responses on the Direct to TOEFL iBT<sup>™</sup>, you will use indirect quotes or paraphrase to refer to the author's or the lecturer's points. When you use the words of the author or lecturer, you should cite the author or speaker to let the reader know where the ideas originated.

A direct quote is the author's exact words; it uses quotation marks (". . ."). An indirect quote uses a clause, often with *says that*. A paraphrase has the same meaning, but uses different grammatical structures and different vocabulary. Compare these examples.

Original (from the reading):

The costs of maintaining a solar energy system are very low.

Direct quote: The author states, "The costs of maintaining a solar energy system are very low."Indirect quote: The author says that the costs of maintaining a solar energy system are very low.Paraphrase: Solar energy maintenance costs are low.



Be careful not to simply copy text from the reading passage. Your score will be lowered if you copy.

When you refer to a reading passage, you can use *author* or *writer*. When you refer to a lecture, you can use words like *speaker*, *lecturer*, or *professor*. You can also use *man* or *woman* (depending on the speaker's gender).
